Disparities in ACEs Among Connecticut High School Youth

What are ACEs?

Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) are potentially traumatic events that occur in childhood and may increase the risk of physical and mental health problems later in life. **Not all youth in Connecticut experience ACEs in the same way.**

Female youth report **multiple ACEs** more frequently than **male** youth.


More females than males report:

- Emotional abuse by a parent or caregiver (16% vs. 9%).
- Sexual abuse by a person at least 5 years older (8% vs. 2%).
- Cyberbullying (18% vs. 9%).
- Sexual teen dating violence (20% vs. 7%).



Black and Hispanic youth report **multiple ACEs** more frequently than **White** youth.


- More Hispanic than White youths have witnessed community violence (30% vs. 13%).
- More Black than White youths have experienced physical and emotional neglect (15% vs. 7%).



Lesbian, gay, and bisexual (LGB) youth report **multiple ACEs** more frequently than h**eterosexual** youth.

More LGB than heterosexual youth report.

- Emotional abuse by a parent (21% vs. 10%).
- Cyberbullying (23% vs. 11%).
- Sexual violence (13% vs. 4%).
